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## **Angels on Call: A Ministry of Belonging and Love**

I never used to worry about daily meals. My life as a pastor has been simple, but I always managed—grabbing something on the go or preparing a quick meal. It was a rhythm I took for granted until everything changed.

When my wife's injury left her needing care, my children fell ill, and I faced my own health challenges, even the smallest tasks became overwhelming. Cooking, once routine, now felt like an insurmountable burden. The cycle of preparing meals and washing dishes wore me down until I simply couldn't do it anymore.

Then *Angels on Call* stepped in. Volunteers arrived with meals, but they brought more than food—they brought kindness, care, and connection. Their hospitality reminded me that community isn't just a comforting

idea; it's the very thing that sustains us. Through their generosity, I felt seen, supported, and deeply loved.

This experience taught me that a meal is more than nourishment—it's a message: *You are not alone. You are part of a family that cares.* Each dish became a symbol of grace, a reminder that we belong to a community rooted in Christ's love.

Scripture speaks to this kind of resilience and connection.
